

Chairman's Message *by Garry Madeiros*

In September we commenced the third year of our planned three year implementation of the Alberta Curriculum. This does not mean that we have completed our journey. It just signifies that all core subjects required by the Alberta Curriculum are now being taught. The most challenging and important part of the transition is the method of instruction which is inquiry based teaching and collaborative learning. This will continue to require strong commitment and hard work by our faculty, as well as on going professional development opportunities and other program resources provided by the school. It is important to remember that we chose this curriculum because it is based on a philosophy that students must be problem solvers, collaborative workers, community/active citizens and global thinkers. All the aspects we believe are critical for our future.

During the summer a number of projects were completed that have either improved aesthetics, refurbished old plant or added new facilities and systems. The most obvious project was the painting of the school, and the colour scheme has generated a wave of positive responses, including words like inviting, warm and fresh. The apartment has been converted into two classrooms which will be discussed further in a future communication. The courtyard bathrooms have been totally renovated. Some minor work included grills for the gym windows, ceiling tile replacement and a mini-science lab for middle school which will be completed during the November break.

Major additions and improvements have been made on the security systems of the school both internally and externally. Security and safety are of paramount importance for our students, faculty and staff. We have installed access control for our gates and the two main doors to the school in conjunction with an intercom and monitoring system. Although we have had some teething problems and some fine tuning still has to be done, control of access to our facility has been greatly improved. In addition we have installed a new CCTV system that includes a network video recorder that can service up to 16 analogue and 64 digital cameras on one server unit. Our old system comprises of 16 analogue cameras and the new installation added 30 digital cameras. The coverage, clarity and benefits of this new system are tremendous.

A new administration package was also installed before the school year commenced. The most important aspect of this system is that it links directly into the Alberta system which allows easy electronic transfer of student data. It is comprehensive in the modules it provides the office for administration of the complete education product but it also includes a very user friendly teacher portal, Home Logic.

Three Board of Governor members stepped off the Board at the end of the school year; Lorna Dixon Marable after two years, Joe Kelly after four years and Tonya Marshall after six years. They graciously and voluntarily gave up their time, energy and skills for the school and the MSA family. I extend the gratitude, thanks and appreciation from all of us for their support, contribution and commitment made during their terms. I express a further thank you to Joe for his role as Facilities Chairman. He worked tirelessly on our behalf and always provided balance, prudence and a special tenacity in all the projects he was involved in. I extend a special thank you to Tonya who served as Deputy Chair for the last three years, and provided us the benefit of her legal expertise on a number of occasions. I will miss her wise counsel.

I take pleasure in announcing that two new members were appointed to the

Board; Dr. Tina Arorash, a Bishop's appointee and Lori Samson, a H&S appointee.

Tina is a graduate of MSA, class of '89 and has a PhD in Clinical and Counseling Psychology from Columbia University. She was a consultant Psychologist for Bermuda Government in the Dept. of Child & Family Services from 2006 – 2011. Just recently, in July, she joined the practice group "The Association of Diagnostic and Psychological Services". There she provides psychological assessment, intervention and consultation services for children, adolescents and their families as well as intervention services for adults. Last year Tina served on the Board's Academic Committee.

Lori, nee Dunstan, is a graduate of MSA, class of '82. She spent twenty years with ACE Limited retiring at the end of 2010. Her first eight years was in the Accounting area and the remainder was in Administration with the last four years as Chief Administration Officer for the ACE Group of Companies, Bermuda. Presently on a part time basis she provides support to the ACE Foundation overseeing all matters pertaining to its day-to-day operations. Lori is the Chairman of the ACE Foundation – Bermuda, and a trustee of the ACE Foundation- International.

The quotation below is from the introduction by Ronald Rolheiser to

his book, "**Forgotten Among the Lilies**".

"Rarely do we taste the food we eat or the coffee we drink. Instead we go through our days too preoccupied, too compulsive, and too dissatisfied to really be able to be present for and celebrate our own lives."

This quotation came to my mind when I thought about how so many of us are not taking the time to be fully present to what we are doing. We seem to want to finish quickly whatever we are doing to get on with the next thing.

When we are at prayer or at Mass are we looking at our watches and thinking about what we are going to

do next? Do we choose to worship at a place where we know the service will be faster? When someone is speaking to us are we secretly wishing them to hurry up so we can "get on with it"?

The Sacrament of the Present Moment means that each moment of our lives is open to "grace", that is, God dwelling within but we need to be in welcoming awareness to receive it. If we are leading our lives in such a welcoming awareness then faster will not be better. We need to slow down as the hackneyed expression says "and smell the roses".
